


# If you're in the mood to visit the iconic sites of San Francisco...

# **Golden Gate Bridge**

One of the most instantly recognizable bridges in the world, the Golden Gate Bridge is truly a regal sight to see, and with a bright orange coat of paint, it's surely near impossible to miss. There are view points on the north side and the south side, and there are numerous companies that rent bicycles that you can ride on the lower deck of the bridge. Make sure to bring a jacket, it gets windy!





# **Alcatraz**

A facility that once operated as a military base, a light-house, and prison, Alcatraz once was the home of America's most notorious mobster, Al Capone. Alcatraz became a National Historic Landmark in 1986, offering historical tours around the facility and the island. Make sure to buy your tickets ahead of time, you're competing with a lot of international tourists! The Halloween night tour is also a favorite, make sure you take it during your time in the city.

Did you know that San Francisco has 215 historic landmark buildings, ten historical districts, and 14,000 Victorian homes?

# **SF Cable Cars**

A little-known fact: the San Francisco Cable Car System is the last manually-operated Cable Car Systems in the world.

With a rich history in San Francisco starting in 1873, the Cable Cars now operate on three lines close to downtown. The most popular line, the Powell-Hyde line, runs from Union Square (Powell and Market) all the way down to Fisherman's Wharf (Beach and Hyde) offering pristine views of the Bay. Hang onto the bars as you go up the hills – they're incredibly steep!





# **Alamo Square/Painted Ladies**

The Painted Ladies at Alamo Square are mostly known not only for their beauty and elegance, but from the opening credits scene of the late 80s/early 90s American television show *Full House*. Put simply, a Painted Lady is a term used for Victorian and Edwardian houses and buildings painted in three or more colors that enhance their architectural beauty. Most noted houses (including Jimi Hendrix and Janis Joplin's old houses on Central) are clustered around the Haight neighborhood, but there are several other Painted Ladies scattered throughout the city.

# **Lombard Street**

Featured in multiple films and TV shows, the steep and beautiful Lombard Street is indeed as steep and beautiful as you imagine it to be—and more! You'll pass this street on your Cable Car Ride down to Fisherman's Wharf.



# Pier 39

Pier 39 is a busy hub of the Fisherman's Wharf neighborhood, full of shops, tourist attractions, restaurants, and street performers. Pier 39 is most notably known for its Sea Lions that come and sprawl out on the docks every year.



# Haight/Ashbury

Most known as the incubator of the 1967 Summer of Love, the Haight-Ashbury (also known as the Upper Haight) neighborhood once drew out thousands of hippies and revolutionaries from all of the country. Today, it is still true to its history and maintains a bohemian ambiance, although there are a number of franchises that have made their home on the famous Haight Street. Great for shopping, people watching, and close walking distance from Golden Gate Park, the Haight-Ashbury is a fun neighborhood that demands a visit.

# **Mission Dolores**

Mission Dolores has always had a central place in the religious, civic, and cultural life of San Francisco. Misión San Francisco de Asís was founded June 29, 1776, under the direction of Father Junipero Serra and is both the oldest original intact Mission in California and the oldest building in San Francisco. Today, the Mission Dolores Parish comprises both the Basilica and the Old Mission. The Old Mission's religious, historic, and architectural significance makes it a unique and memorable destination for visitors to San Francisco; it located at the intersection of 16th and Dolores Street.



# Chinatown

Practically a city within a city, San Francisco's Chinatown is the oldest Chinatown in North America and hoses the largest Chinese community outside of Asia. Since Angel Island (the Ellis Island of the Western United States) is not too far away from San Francisco, Chinese immigrants came here to establish their own community. Chinatown continues to hold on to a lot of historically formed organizations that thrive in this ethnic enclave. With stunning architecture, curious stores and plenty of people-watching, Chinatown is most certainly worth the visit.




# If you're in the mood for park explorations...

San Francisco is home to a number of parks that offer a get-away from the hustle and bustle of city life. Whether it's a long afternoon stroll through Golden Gate Park, a Lord-of-the-Rings-like quest up Twin Peaks or Corona Heights, or simply laying out in the sun atop Alamo Square, you'll be sure to find a park in your neighborhood that fits your lifestyle. The following are a list of well-known parks in San Francisco.

# **Golden Gate Park**

Often referred to as the "Central Park of the West Coast," Golden Gate Park spans 1.5 square miles in the north west quadrant of the city. With an estimate of 13 Million visitors annually, Golden Gate Park is the 3rd most visited park In the United States. There are so many places to go and see inside the park that each trip will offer a new experience: a tea ceremony at the Japanese Tea House, a breathtaking museum exhibit, an encounter with Bison, a music festival, or anything else in between. # **Dolores Park**

This Park is a lazy haven in the Mission-Dolores neighborhood. Located next to the historic Mission Dolores, this park draws everyone and anyone looking to relax and curl up in a sunbeam. Dolores Park is host to numerous festivities throughout the year, including SF Pride Festival, the Hunky Jesus Competition, and the Fourth of July. In addition to the sunny fields, there are basketball courts, tennis courts, and frequent food truck visitors. There is no other park quite like Dolores, so it begs to be checked out. The park is located between 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> streets on Dolores Street.



# The Presidio

The Presidio is a beautiful and somewhat secluded park area of San Francisco that once served as an Army Post for 2 nations. The Presidio is home to numerous hiking and walking trails, a golf course, old forts and barracks, and rows of Eucalyptus trees that permeate the air with zesty refreshment. Towards the northern part of the park are beaches and stunning views of the Bay and the Golden Gate Bridge, which actually emerges from the Presidio, not Golden Gate Park which some might assume! This park is truly dazzling and deserves a visit.



# Sutro Baths/Land's End

Located at the top left corner of the city, the Sutro Bath Ruins are a beautiful sight to see. The Sutro Baths was, at one time, the world's largest indoor swimming pool establishment. Unfortunately it burned down in the late 1960s, and all that is left of them are the ruins in a cove that opens up to the Pacific Ocean. These ruins are adjacent to Land's End Park which offers peaceful scenic trails along the coast.

# **Buena Vista Park**

Buena Vista Park is the oldest official park in San Francisco, offering stunning views of the City's northern quadrant. Bordered by Haight Street to the north, this park is convenient to get to and to explore.

# **Twin Peaks**

# **East Beach**

Marina/Cow Hollow, North edge of Crissy Field. Golden Gate is to your left and Alcatraz to the right and Tiburon right in front of you.



# **Baker Beach**

A public beach, roughly a half mile long, the north end is considered "clothing optional." Located just southwest of the Golden Gate Bridge, it boasts a stunning, close-up view!



# **China Beach**

Small cove in San Francisco's Sea Cliff neighborhood. This is one of the cleanest in the state. Robin Williams and other famous celebrities have houses nearby.



# **Ocean Beach**

Runs along the west coast of San Francisco at the Pacific Ocean. Part of Golden Gate National Recreation Area. Great Highway runs along the beach and the Cliff House and former Sutro Baths are at the northern end.






# <u>Trip One: Inner Richmond—Haight—the Mission</u>

- 1. Breakfast in Inner Richmond (Dim Sum to-go)
- 2. Walk through Golden Gate Park onto Haight Street
- 3. Stop at Amoeba Records
- 4. Walk up Buena Vista East to Corona Heights
- 5. Walk down 16th street to Ike's Sandwiches (3489 16th St)
- 6. Walk to Dolores Park to eat your sandwich and lie in the sun
- 7. Walk towards the Mission for drinks/thrift store shopping



# <u>Trip Two: Embarcadero —Telegraph Hill — North beach—Chinatown</u>

- 1. Start at the Ferry Building
- 2. Walk North along the Embarcadero
- 3. Stop by Pier 7 for stunning views of the Bay Bridge
- 4. Walk west towards the Filbert Steps
- 5. Wander up the Filbert Steps towards Coit Tower
- 6. Walk down from Coit Tower along Kearny towards the Peter Macchiarini Steps (between Broadway and Vallejo Streets)
- 7. Take a left and stop into City Lights Bookstore
- 8. Wander into Chinatown on Grant Street for something to munch on
- 9. Visit the Fortune Cookie Factory

- 1. Start at Haight and Stanyan
- 2. Purchase some food stuffs and various goodies from Whole Foods Market
- 3. Wander through Golden Gate Park beginning at the entrance
- 4. Enter the San Francisco Botanical Gardens (1199 9th Ave) [bring proof of residency for free admission!]
- 5. From the botanical gardens, walk around Stow Lake, eat your food!

# San Francisco Neighborhoods

San Francisco is one of the most distinguished and celebrated cities in the world. Its diverse cultures and lifestyles attract prospective students to the city, and with a little bit of direction, you can discover all the treasures of San Francisco!

### THE CASTRO

The universally-agreed historic Mecca of gay life is San Francisco's Castro District. It is home to a predominantly lesbian/gay/bisexual/transgender community with excellent bakeries, boutiques, cafes, restaurants and nightlife. The Castro hosts a variety of festivals, street fairs and activities throughout the year.

### COLE VALLEY/UCSF

Nestled between the Sunset district and Haight-Ashbury, this generally cute and quiet neighborhood is populated by families and young professionals. Here you'll find a variety of mom-and-pop shops in lieu of mainstream franchises.

### **HAIGHT-ASHBURY**

Commonly referred to as the Upper Haight, the Haight-Ashbury was the center of '60s hippie movement. It is a bustling center of gift shops, piercing salons, vintage clothing stores and Amoeba Music, the country's largest independent music store.

### **HAYES VALLEY/CIVIC CENTER**

With the Asian Art Museum, San Francisco Ballet, Opera, Symphony, SF Jazz, and the Conservatory, Civic Center is the cultural nexus of San Francisco. Adjacent to Civic Center is Hayes Valley, which caters to the "symphony crowd" with its fine restaurants, boutiques, trendy furniture stores and upscale shoe emporia.

# NOE VALLEY

West of the Mission and south of the Castro is Noe Valley. Its streets are lined with beautifully renovated Victorians. Somewhat upscale and slower-paced, Noe Valley attracts young families, students, artists and professionals.

### PACIFIC HEIGHTS

A very wealthy neighborhood offering beautiful multi-million dollar homes and amazing views, Pacific Heights boasts upscale shopping and restaurants. However, some find the most exciting activity is to sit at a sidewalk café on Fillmore Street and people watch.

### THE RICHMOND DISTRICT

A middle-income, family-oriented area, the Richmond is convenient to a variety of shops, restaurants and transportation. With a large Russian and East Asian population, it's not difficult to find amazing food. This neighborhood is relatively inexpensive and is close to Ocean Beach, The Presidio, and Golden Gate Park.

### NORTH BEACH/CHINATOWN

Even though it's home to Little Italy and the Beat movement, North Beach offers an extremely wide variety of restaurants, bars, clubs, shopping (fantastic bookstores and funky shops) and sites. Chinatown is the oldest and one of the largest Chinatowns in the US.

# **LOWER HAIGHT/WESTERN ADDITION**

A punky off-shoot of the Haight-Ashbury area, the Lower Haight is one of the more culturally and economically diverse neighborhoods in San Francisco. This area offers unique restaurants and bars overflowing with locals, as well as intriguing shops offering everything you could imagine.

### THE MARINA

A picturesque area that boasts many tourist attractions but also a plethora of trendy restaurants, bars, and shopping. Many young professionals call this area home.

### THE MISSION

Easily mistaken as Central America, the Mission is an exceptionally diverse area of San Francisco with a strong Latino influence. The area boasts a colorful collection of authentic restaurants, taquerías, bakeries, produce markets, specialty shops, kaleidoscopic murals, and a lively, thriving bar scene.

### NOB HILL

Known for its landmarks and famous hotels, upscale Nob Hill offers a wide variety of shops, restaurants, and a range of bars and clubs.

### RUSSIAN HILL

Encompassing two of the highest points in San Francisco, Russian Hill is a neighborhood of steep ascents and descents, panoramic views, interesting restaurants and shops on Hyde and Polk Streets, and fairly pricey housing for its location. Macondray Lane was the inspiration for Barbary Lane in Armistead Maupin's Tales of the City.

### POTRERO HILL

Once a largely industrial area, the Internet boom brought a change with warehouses being converted ninto offices, houses, and art studios. A unique and rapidly gentrifying area, you will find a unique community of artists, musicians, and young professional techies.

### THE SUNSET DISTRICT

Home of the Conservatory from 1956 to 2006, this largely residential area is a good place to find affordable housing. Irving Street features a number of excellent, reasonably-priced restaurants, bars, and shops.
